It was quite a remarkable event, with practically every leading early brass musician in attendance. I'm glad to report that the HBS is now planning to present the 2nd International HBS Symposium, which will exceed even the 1995 event in size and scope. It will be held in New York City, Thursday, July 12 through Sunday, July 15, 2012. The Symposium will be held at the home of the New School Jazz Program in New York's picturesque Greenwich Village. Plans are underway to invite all major early brass performers and scholars to participate.
